### **Healing**

Jesus went back to Simon's house with the others after worshipping in the synagogue. There Simon's mother-in-law was ill in bed. He 'took her by the hand and lifted her up'. So begins Jesus' healing ministry in Mark's gospel. And so it continues when we pray in his name, for those seen and unseen, brought low by injury, fear, and famine. Pray for an outbreak of love in our hearts this Lent. May we pray for the healing of hate and mercilessness wherever it destroys minds and bodies.

*God heals the broken-hearted and binds up their wounds. Psalm 147:3*

We give thanks today for the work of our members in Ghana where they are in healing by raising awareness of gender-based violence. They also assist in healing young lives by running schools and homework clubs. Early marriage is detrimental to young girls so MU is educating parents and teachers. Members also offer practical health awareness and hospital and prison visiting. We hold in heartfelt prayer our sisters who work in Jesus' name for the healing of others.

In the DR Congo women and girls live every day in fear of rape, its brutality and betrayal and ignominy. We give thanks for MU in the eastern dioceses who work with those whose lives are torn apart, the women and girls and the children born from sexual violence, with skills training, emotional and psychological support. We pray with them who say we 'want so much for rape to end'.

Membership in AMARE thrives: their new indigenous bishop commented, "Before AMARE the women felt they were nothing. Now they have a voice and are working. What should we men be doing?"
