

WAITING

One of the characteristics of life these days is that we are often called on to wait: wait for the bus: wait for the results of medical tests; wait for notice from a financial institution as to whether we have been accepted for a loan; wait for



news of a family birth, or just waiting in the queue for a checkout at the supermarket. Each time patience is required, and, at times, this is so hard to do ... we want things to happen ... NOW.

As I write this, we are in the Church's Easter season; the time between Easter and Pentecost and I am reminded how the disciples were told by Jesus to wait for the coming of the Holy Spirit. After the awe-inspiring news that Jesus had risen, and having seen him in the flesh, they still had to wait. I believe this waiting time for them was essential for them; they took the time to reflect on all Jesus had told them, all that was in the scriptures, and to discuss with each other all this meant for them and their faith ... their faith was invigorated, giving them the courage to step out in faith to share this faith with others after Pentecost.

I don't know about you, but I have found that many of the times I have had to wait for something I thought should happen immediately, I became aware of aspects of the situation I had not noticed before ... I have been strengthened for the future ... and, in time, I have found the new timing perfect. In many of these cases I have learnt that God's timing is sensational and the fact that God wastes nothing.



It is in hindsight we realise the immense blessing contained in the gift of time, the gift given to the disciples and often given to us.

May we continually learn to thank God for this gift of waiting and the grace God gives us through time.

Marjory's Story

It is interesting to look back on life and see how many threads have been woven together over time



and as a result you take on a position you never expected to.

In the sixties my mother, Marjory McAlister was involved in our local Church and she attended YMD for many years at Holy Trinity Kew in suburban Melbourne.

In 1979, my husband, myself and two young children left Melbourne to live in Wewak, Papua New Guinea. There was no technology, no television, the only way we could communicate with back home was to write letters regularly. Ilooked forward to receiving letters from home. Fast forward to 2009. Irene Daniel was starting a new AMUA Branch at St James' Anglican at Biggera Waters. I was working part time and, along with three others, became an inaugural member of the new branch. Over the years, I held many positions including Secretary, President and Deanery Secretary. I am currently Link Correspondent staying in contact with St Mary's Branch at Sunbury, Victoria.

In August, 2019 Alison Dunstan approached me about the position of Lone Member Correspondent. I thought, "How could I do that?" I went home and thought and prayed about it. I remembered all the letters I had written home when I lived in Papua New Guinea. I accepted the position which has opened up a whole new world for me.

Lone Members come from all around the large Diocese of Southern Queensland. When I look at the ladies' profiles and read what they have done over many years, I am in awe of them.

I send out four letters a year along with prayer notes from Prayer and Spirituality Department. I receive letters, emails and phone calls from members telling me their news. For example, members who live on farms will tell of good rainfall which enables them to have a bumper harvest. A member swaps knitting patterns with me as like me, she enjoys knitting. Another writes such interesting stories about what her AMUA Branch did before it closed. A member knits beanies for Seafarers which the Mission is grateful to receive.

A few years ago Dalby was flooded and I was concerned for two lone members who live there. I phoned and was relieved to hear they were dry. Each April I attend a combined Ipswich/ Laidley Lone Member Gathering, taking the banner with me.

I am guardian of the lone members banner, which is displayed at my church, St James at Biggera Waters. Every time I see that banner, I think of all the Lone Members and remember them in my prayers. I have proudly carried this banner at the Lady Day Service at the Cathedral on behalf of all lonem embers. This year Gwen Davenport from Rosewood carried it for us. I have taken the banner to Laidley and Southport, where one lone member said she never realised we had a banner!

For the last two years I have joined the Cathedral Branch outside St John's Cathedral to protest on 25 November about gender-based violence. I send the prayer notes to all lone members and encourage them to join in the 16 Days of Activism. I also encourage members to join in the Wave of Prayer. I appreciate the help I get from Val Madsen who keeps in contact regularly with lone members out west.

I can't tell you how much I enjoy my role. I give thanks for what lone

members have done for AMUA. It inspires me that they still want to be connected to AMUA even though they are not able to attend Meetings.

On looking back, I am so pleased I accepted this position back in 2019. It is very fulfilling and I am so blessed I am able to connect with these wonderful ladies and still be an active member of Gold Coast North Branch.
