AMUA Queensland Provincial Conference 2023

From 16-19 May, 72 AMUA members converged at beautiful St Charles's Church, Mackay, for the Queensland and Northern Territory Conference, hosted by the Diocese of North Queensland (NQ), to explore the theme of Unity in Diversity. Each evening, guest speakers entertained and inspired us, including the Rt Rev Dr Keith Joseph, who, after warmly welcoming





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attendees, spoke about some of his life experiences in the Army Medical Corp. The Rev'd Nikki Vella Power, a Mackay Street Chaplain, encouraged us to listen to the "Voice of God" and to be Christlike in whom we are. Ms Jules Thomson, founder of Broken Ballerina, a domestic violence victim support agency, bravely shared her personal story of DV trauma survival.

After sharing cultural insights the beautiful voices of our sisters from our First Nations people and neighbours from Melanesia would lead us into Compline. Highlights included praise in Language and original song compositions as well as singing and dancing to the song "We are all one big happy family-God's family".

During the opening service, the Very Rev'd Dr Kenneth Lay reminded us not to confuse unity with conformity. He reflected that tolerance of differences should give way to acceptance, as through the acceptance of the beautiful array of customs, traditions and people that we are in Mothers Union, unity can be achieved.

Attendees participated in a series of four workshops exploring Unity















in Diversity of Worship, Service, Prayer, and Love. These were interspersed by sessions, led by our Australian Overseas and Northern Outreach Coordinator Wendy Mabey, who applied each theme to a world context. Facilitators challenged us with interesting questions such as: If you have experienced worship in a different context, did anything challenge, bewilder or enrich you and why? How might we incorporate people of diverse cultures into worship? Do we know of, and work with other like- minded community agencies in meeting needs? Do we advocate for others? How can each of our five senses be used creatively to enrich both our personal and corporate prayer life? If sharing is loving and sharing is caring, how does your branch show God's love in action?

In response to the challenges highlighted by Wendy, it was agreed to distribute \$7000 from the Provincial Conference Account, with \$5000 divided equally between Northern and Overseas Outreach via Mary Sumner House. Our Australian Overseas Target project is to receive \$2500.

In her President's address Dr Robin Ray highlighted that AMUA was at a crossroads. She encouraged us to prepare a statement of what we would say to someone, if asked to explain Mothers Union in Australia; to question all that we do- How does this fit with our mission for God and our MU Objectives? She reminded us that our inwardly nurturing activities such as prayer, bible study, fellowship served as the foundation that enabled us to focus outwardly. She challenged us to become visible. In closing she posed the questions "Where is the Spirit inviting you? Do you have the courage to go forward to write yourself into a new MU story or will you turn away in dread, with a feeling of weakness and with a sigh of relief return to life as normal"?

All left Mackay, conscious of the challenges, full of joy and thankfulness and enthused with new ideas, eagerly looking forward to the next Conference, to be hosted by the Brisbane Diocese.

Sustainability Roadmap - A Call to Action

The Dean, the Very Rev'd Dr Peter Catt sent links for the Sustainability Roadmap 2013-2030 for us to take part.

Vision: We actively participate in the flourishing of God's creation by working deliberately, urgently, creatively to limit and reduce human-induced warming and the resultant effects of climate change.

Goals: to be achieved by 2030.

- 1). Innovate Institutional responsibility
- 2). Encourage Personal responsibility
- 3). Advocate We will stand with those most affected by climate change

Bishop Administrator Cam Venables reflected in his sermon 2020 Australia bushfires, how the damaged climate amplified the fires and how our faith can orientate us into the future. The report said the fire killed or displaced almost three billion native animals.

It can be adapted to member/household use. The main idea is that members and householders can plan how they will reduce their carbon footprint over a period of seven (7) years. e.g. you can plan ahead to install an electric stove, solar power etc. It makes it more manageable.

Each member and community should consider its own unique situation and need to plan and implement positive changes for creation. Also, to limit sea-level rise and protect the homes and livelihoods of our First Nation people and Torres Strait Islanders, and our Pacific neighbours. The roadmap is one of our Diocese's responses to the General Synod's

Protection of the Environment Canon 2007 which says, 'This Church recognises that climate change is a most serious threat to the lives of the present and future generations'.

Imagine you are all alone, removed from your family, feeling rejection and shame this has happened to you. You still have a connection with home, your possessions in a garbage bag. How demoralising!

St Luke's Toowoomba AMUA had a a speaker from Hope for our Children telling of their role in placing children in foster care. Too many children are still in in care - 2,700 in Toowoomba area alone. They connect with the Mercy Centre and

Department of Child Safety in areas of Roma, Ipswich and Toowoomba.

Children are required to attend Court which is very traumatic. A therapy dog can bring comfort. By cuddling and patting the dog the child becomes calmer and gives clearer evidence, resulting in better justice for all concerned. The dog visits paediatric wards, youth mental health wards, local hospice and court house - providing comfort, distraction and peace to our most vulnerable.

A Reflection from our Chaplain

Last Sunday I had the privilege of participating with some young people in thinking about the pearl of great price and reflecting on what some people may search for as their pearl/s be it a car, house, or their faith in God.

Today as I organised prayers for the AMUA Diocesan Executive I found a number of prayers which may be considered pearls in expressing the Christian faith. One struck me for the simplicity of the words, and for the



expression of many of my recent thoughts and prayers as I acknowledge I am no longer in my 20s or 30s or I know there are many of us adjusting to limitations which have come to ourselves and our loved ones. For this reason I have attached this prayer for you to read, reflect on and pray. (I have not changed the language which is a few centuries old as I sense it is so much part of the prayer.)

Lord, thou knowest better than I know myself that I am getting older and will someday be older. Keep me from the fatal habit of thinking I must say something on every subject and on every occasion. Release me from craving to straighten our everyone's affairs. Make me thoughtful but not moody: helpful but not bossy. With my vast store of wisdom it seems a pity not to use it all, but thou knowest, Lord, that I want a few friends at the end.

Keep my mind free from the recital of endless details; give me wings to get to the point. Seal my lips on my aches and pains. They are increasing and love of rehearsing them is becoming sweeter as the years go by. I dare not ask for grace enough to enjoy the tales of others' pains, but help me to endure them with patience.

I dare not ask for improved memory, but for a growing humility and lessening cocksureness when my memory seems to clash with the memories of others. Teach me the glorious lesson that occasionally I may be mistaken.

Keep me reasonably sweet; I do not want to be a saint – some of them are so hard to live with – but a sour old person is one of crowning works of the devil. Give me the ability to see good things in unexpected places, and talents in unexpected people. And, give me, O Lord, the grace to tell them so.

In 1995 to 1999 was the President. 2000 – 2004 and 2007-2009 she became Vice President and from 2013 until 2020 Hilda was Link Secretary and faithfully communicated often. Hilda received her scrolls and badges for 40 years, 50 years and 55 years and her very prized 60 year badge in 2022, presented by Jenny Bullock, President.
