#### **SECRETARY**

**Building Hope and Confidence** has been our Theme for the past two years and it has been most appropriate as we have had to cope with changes and new regulations due to the COVID 19 pandemic. All this as we were still lamenting over vacating our home for many years in Leigh Street. We certainly have been hopeful and have great confidence in our Executive to take us into the future with new ideas and new procedures.

Due to the Covid restrictions we have only been able to have two Council meetings this year - our Annual General Meeting in February and the November meeting. The say kitchen has to abide by strict regulations on numbers gathering in their meeting rooms. This meant that the mid-year Council had to be cancelled and the November one limited in numbers attending. Both these meetings went well and with a positive attitude.

Lady Day was a splendid celebration. The Very Reverend Frank Nelson Preached and Presided at this service as one of his last duties before his retirement as Dean of the Cathedral and his move to New Zealand. His sermon was so well received we were asked if copies of it could be sent to members. Dean Frank agreed to this and so copies were sent to those who requested it. Our Vice Regal Patron, Mrs Lan Le, also attended with her usual grace. Due to Covid hygiene regulations, rather than Mrs Le presenting badges and scrolls to members for their long service, these members stood in their places in the Nave and were greeted with acclamation. One sad thing, only our Diocesan Banner was paraded at the entrance to the service. Members have found bringing banners into Adelaide very inconvenient with car parking unavailable around the Cathedral. Therefore, it was thought that no branch banners would be paraded this year.

Our second important celebration of the year was Mary Sumner Day in August. The Prospect Parish extended a welcome to Mothers' Union for this year's service and we thank our Chaplain, Reverend Dawn Colsey for her

organisation of the service and for her reflective sermon. There was a great feeling of love and fellowship on the day which is what MU is all about.

We were very lucky to be able to have our two fund-raising events this year. Film mornings at the Kensington Cinema and the Capri at Goodwood. The response to these events was excellent and you will see in our Treasurer's Report how our funds were boosted for us to be able to support our projects which are also noted in his Report. On behalf of your Executive, I thank you all for your support of these projects.

Mothers' Union in this Diocese is very supportive of the World Day of Prayer Committee and we have encouraged members to support their local WDP service or the City service which this year was held in the Pilgrim Church, Flinders Street. WDP is always celebrated on the first Friday in March. This year the focus was Vanuatu and the many problems faced by that nation.

#### **CHAPLAIN**

This is the sixth year in which I've been your chaplain, and I'm now recognised as a chaplain, thanks to Susan McLeod's relatively new role as Senior Chaplain. My main task in the past twelve months has been to prepare a reflection for Executive and Council meetings, which I have done with pleasure.

It's also been my privilege to companion our President Marion McCall OAM in her journey during Bishop David McCall's illness, and after his death on 7<sup>th</sup> May 2021. His funeral in St Peter's Cathedral was a wonderful celebration of his life, and revealed the amazing musical and speaking talents of an amazing family.

Covid has made an impact on when and where we have been able to have face to face meetings as Executive and in branches, but the big change has been in the move from the Leigh Street rooms to the use of St Barnabas College for Executive and the say.kitchen for Council.

The month of March saw two important events: the World Day of Prayer, which we supported at Pilgrim Uniting as the city venue, and our first major festival, Lady Day in the Cathedral, with the Very Rev'd Frank Nelson, the Dean, presiding and preaching before his departure for New Zealand.

On 12<sup>th</sup> May I conducted a Quiet Morning of Reflection on the theme of HOPE at St Andrew's Walkerville, where the Reverend Sam Goodes had everything beautifully organised for our Eucharist and Covid safe morning tea and lunch.

I don't think I need to talk about film mornings – we all enjoy them and the effort put into making them sociable and profitable.

One highlight of the year for me was Mary Sumner Day at St Cuthbert's Prospect, where the Reverend Tim Sherwell presided and I preached. Tim was my "Training Minister" at St Edward's Kensington Gardens.

On 8<sup>th</sup> September Mitcham MU celebrated 125 years. I had a prior engagement, but arrived in time to get the feeling of what a happy and special day it was for this really active branch. I have promised a Mary Potter Rose for their beautifully refurbished rose garden when we can locate one at the right time for planting.

On 30<sup>th</sup> September I had the pleasure of presiding and preaching at St Jude's Brighton, and I chose the topic of "Angels," as it was close to the Feast of Michael and All Angels. It brought forth very interesting stories of encounters with angels in whatever form, as happened also when I used the same topic at St Elizabeth's Warradale a fortnight later.

A Zoom meeting for the Pacific Region was a new experience for me – not easy to participate in, but it was fascinating to hear from Sydney and Melbourne about how immigrant and refugee women are joining MU, or resisting and meeting in their own communities.

Covid restrictions meant the curtailing of some events – Belair's kind invitation to lunch in November – and a final Executive meeting without invited guests or shared festive lunch.

One cause which we all supported in our own way was the marking of Global Day in November: the keeping of three minutes' silence to reflect on and pray for the end to domestic violence in all its forms throughout the world.

After two years of study in the Ignatian tradition, and continuing in an ecumenical setting for a third year, my future work will mostly be in offering Spiritual Direction to individuals who seek that kind of companioning in their spiritual life.

My thanks go to Marion for her leadership in a very difficult year, together with Dorothy Ferrier, joint Vice-President with me, and our indefatigable Secretary Betty Edwards, as well as to all members of Executive including Christine Barber in Spirituality, and our Treasurer Rob Jackson who has really found his feet.

#### **PUBLICATION**

You will be pleased to hear that all the blue Christmas cards, all but about fifty of the red and all the diaries were sold last year, but not all by active branches. A significant number of cards and diaries were sold by Elizabeth Laffrey at Elizabeth, Joan Middleton at Plympton, Reverend Lesley McLean at Campbelltown and Bett Moller at Lockleys.

During 2021, I took MU items to sell, and freebies to give away, at film mornings, Mary Sumner Day and the Day of Reflection.

## **SOCIAL ISSUES**

The continuation of the Covid 19 Pandemic has, of course, meant a continuance of many social problems, namely domestic violence, homelessness, drug addiction, and an increase in alcohol consumption, especially in women and the unemployed

Our Mothers' Union Social Issues and Action Coordinator, Susan Skowronski, continues to alert us to projects that our organisation is particularly concerned with.

The United Nations World Day of Social Justice is annually observed on February 24th to encourage people to look at how social justice affects poverty eradication. It also focuses on the goal of achieving full employment and support for social integration.

Bringing year 7 students into secondary schools will, according to educators, enable students to be taught in the way it is intended. South Australia is now in line with the rest of Australia and students will have access to specialist facilities and teachers.

There is concern for the care of residents in nursing homes during the Omicron variant, with claims that the aged are being neglected in some homes.

"Safe and affordable housing must be a priority" say services supporting domestic violence victims, people with disabilities and youths leaving state care. Soaring house and rental prices have resulted in a shortage of housing.

Naming Dylan Alcott as Australian of the Year is a good choice. He is a shining example of a disabled person making the most of his life.

I am aware that there are so many issues about which I could speak but I feel sure that MU members will continue to be alert to, and pray about, the many social issues in our society.

Ann Dickinson's daughter, Alex had prepared a delicious cake topped with lemon and orange syrup for the occasion. Members then shared with one another, a special holiday venue which they had enjoyed. Apart from a geography lesson, everyone learned a little more about each other.

Responding to the Global campaign, the Zonta Club in Gawler had arranged a week of activities protesting against family violence and had invited the public to join them in a Gawler park. Following a notice placed in the pew sheet by Father Bart, members from Mothers' Union, the Gawler Caritas group and several parishioners joined with Zonta. The Mothers' Union banner was displayed on a stand which had been specially made. Ceramic tiles are to be decorated, with the number of tiles corresponding with the number of women killed through family violence. The tiles will then form a mural and be displayed in the park as a monument to these women.

At the meeting in November, a Christmas craft morning with Alex was held which provided a happy and productive time. Christmas lunch was enjoyed at a Gawler restaurant.

#### **Elizabeth Downs Branch**

The first meeting, held on February 2nd, was the day of the Presentation of our Lord. After opening with Form Two in the MU prayer book, a discussion was held about being mindful of the beliefs of others. Father Piers talked about how to stay in touch with those unable to attend and Barbara showed everyone the very attractive knitted flowers she had made for the church.

In March, Tash from Anglicare, spoke about her work as a social worker, helping people to connect and communicate with one another through socialising, craftwork and arts. Joyce spoke about the bags of toiletries

collected and where they go. They are given to Anglicare and Reverend Prue, for the homeless enabling them to have showers, and to the Lyell McEwin Hospital.

Speaker Charles talked of Easter and Lent. He spoke of fasting, pancakes and lunar months which was most interesting and led to an article being submitted and then published in the Link in June.

In June, Beth Ingram spoke of her sixty four years in Mothers' Union and of how she became involved and at the July meeting, held in Indigenous Week, President Linda found a lovely Aboriginal Blessing by Brook Prentis.

The August meeting was cancelled owing to Covid but the President posted relevant information and prayers to all members. October and November were just "getting in touch and catching up".

The following month it was decided to "bring a plate" as it was the last meeting of the year. This provided much amusement! Was the plate to be empty, how big and what to do with this plate? This went back to the early 1960s, when migrants first experienced "bring a plate" and they didn't know what this meant. They did eventually learn!!

On the twenty seventh of November a small service about Gender Based Violence was held with a good number of people attending. This was followed by coffee and cake.

A yoga demonstration provided a "fun time" to finish off the year.

#### Salisbury Branch.

During the service in February, Jean Malander was presented with her twenty five year membership badge and scroll and in March, Jennifer Sutherland gave a presentation on family, using the parable of the Prodigal Son as background.

Olive Bennell, head of Anglicare's Homelessness Programme, was the speaker in April. She told of the reduced number of properties available to rent at affordable rates, which was forcing care agencies to accommodate the homeless in motels.

In May, as many had been unable to attend Lady Day, the Dean's sermon was read to all.

Jill and Brian Polkinghorne were the guest speakers in June. They presented a very interesting illustrated account of their work in Tanzania. Brian had been very involved in agriculture and Jill with various aspects of work involving the women and girls. Members were very pleased to welcome Joyline Flint and Maureen Nicholls as special guests.

At the July meeting, two members, Pat Burgess and Leonie Olsson described their individual holidays in the Flinders Ranges and their very different types of accommodation.

The August meeting was cancelled but members met again in September for a "chat". The allocation of monies to the projects was finalised at the October meeting.

In November, members discussed the Sri Lankan family from Biloela in Queensland. Everyone expressed concern over the plight of this family and all refugees coming to Australia.

Lunch at meetings has proved interesting! Everyone brings the usual shared lunch which is served in a covid-safe way and then the rules change and they have to be contacted and asked to bring individual sandwiches. A shared Christmas lunch however was held and members brought Christmas gifts for children to be given to Reverend Prue to distribute through Quickest Warmth.

Members in Gawler Area have continued to support the Quickest Warmth Project, our Mothers' Union projects, and have attended events when possible. We are hopeful that in 2022 we shall return to normality so that we can look forward to our usual meetings and activities once again. It would be such a big step forward if we didn't have to wear those wretched masks!

#### **SOUTHERN AREA**

The Southern Area comprises Belair with 10 members, Glen Osmond with 8, Hawthorn has 19 and Mitcham 24. The total of 61 includes 2 new inductees in both Hawthorn and Mitcham, 1 in Glen Osmond (our Link editor in fact) and 3 women who re-joined Mitcham after an absence of many years. The branches are well supported by their priests.

The highlight for 2021, was Mitcham's 125<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration. The occasion was marked with a thanksgiving service followed by special prayers at the rehabilitated MU garden. Three senior members were interviewed and one of them was recognised for her 65 years membership.

The power of prayer was the theme for all Belair meetings. The group was encouraged by *James 5:16 "The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective"* and members knew that despite the restrictions of covid, they could still pray for families, friends and communities and particularly for those whose relatives had died or lost their livelihoods. Members shared readings, hymns, and passages from the Bible that have carried them through tough times or enabled them to carry on praising God.

At one stage Belair became concerned with dwindling numbers but regular members resolved to keep the meetings informal to encourage infrequent members to come. It was recognised that catching up in person and being united in prayer was beneficial to all.

Belair's overseas linked branches have closed due to age and infirmity, but its connection with Port Lincoln remains. Mitcham is encouraging a link with Naracoorte and recreating a local one with Hawthorn and an overseas one in Cornwall.

Glen Osmond always preceded its meetings with attendance at the parish morning Eucharist, and lunch frequently followed. A special Advent lunch was hosted by a member in her home which raised funds for MU projects.

Encouraged by their priest, Hawthorn members used the church for their meetings to avoid the pandemic restrictions. This proved very successful.

Speakers throughout the south were varied with knowledge imparted on subjects such as cochlear implants, performing surgery in Rwanda during the troubles, mining church archives, Australian women pilots and a fascinating insight into bell ringing and the sets of bells in Adelaide. This talk, which was illustrated in sound, left its audience exhausted but very satisfied given the mathematics and mechanics involved.

Some of the activities included a visit to Anglicare Westbourne Park, participating in the worldwide global day to support victims of domestic violence and filling boxes for children at Christmas. Mitcham's successful monthly trading tables meant that \$1400 was distributed to 4 of the major projects. The Quickest Warmth Project was well supported along with the 5 diocesan events, Lady Day, Mary Sumner Day, the Day of Quiet Reflection and 2 film mornings.

All in all, I felt that 2021 was a more contemplative year, but a very thankful one.

# **NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN.**

Mothers' Union is a member of NCW, a representative body of Women's Groups with a voice to the community. It is affiliated with The National Council of Women of Australia Ltd, and The International Council of Women which has consultative status Category 1 with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC).

NCW has taken on a very comprehensive presence in the community under the presidency of Mrs Fiona Dorman who took on the additional role of Chair of the Premiers Women's Council in South Australia for two years. Meetings were covered by Zoom when numbers were restricted. A Strategic Planning Day was held to discuss Advocacy issues. An online survey followed ("Advocacy Priorities for 2021 and beyond – what matters to you") from which a priority list was formed for future action with affordable housing both public and social, particularly for older women, being given the highest priority.

Guest Speakers at our meetings have been many on a wide range of topics. If you are interested in them, please contact me.

NCW distributed the Premier's two new Pilot Mentoring Programs to support veterans across South Australia, and a paper from member Dr Wendy Abigail, (Health, Nutrition and Wellness Advisor) *Aged care issues - A Focus on Health Care Packages.* NCW participated in Women's Health Week on 7th September 2021 when the ABC, in collaboration with the Multicultural Communities of SA, hosted a conversation facilitated by ABC Radio announcer Sonya Feldhoff, *"Menopause - Let's not talk about that"*.

The Pioneer Women's Memorial Garden Trust which is affiliated to NCW celebrated its 80th anniversary in April.

Earlier in the year, former President Betty Khor was awarded the highest SA Volunteer Award, the Joy Noble Medal which was presented by the Premier of SA, Steven Marshall MP and our then Governor, His Excellency Hieu Van Le.

#### **WORLD DAY OF PRAYER**

Please put next year's WDP in your diaries – Friday, 4th March in the Bethlehem Church in Flinders Street. The focus will be on England, Wales and Northern Ireland and we seek your continuing prayers and support for the World Day of Prayer.

## Mothers' Union Adelaide Augustus Short Scholarship

Augustus Short was the first Anglican Bishop of Adelaide, a position which he held for 25 years. He also became the first Chancellor of The University of Adelaide and was a great advocate for tertiary education being available to anyone regardless of their financial means or status.

In recent years, the university established scholarships to honour his name and ideals. These are available to any fulltime student of merit who is disadvantaged in some way i.e. financially, disablement or coming from remote or rural areas etc.

In 2021, 70 applicants vied for 3 scholarships which were publicly funded. Mothers' Union executive deemed that is was possible to fund one scholarship for 4 years at \$6,500 per year thus making a difference to one person, their family and potentially having a ripple effect into the community. This mirrors Anglicare's Augustus Short Scholarship.

President Marion signed the agreement in December 2021. Applications opened on 17<sup>th</sup> January and closed today, 25<sup>th</sup> February. I have placed a summary in the next LINK. Here is the internet connection to our page on the university web site.

## TREASURER'S REPORT - JANUARY - DECEMBER 2021

The Treasurer's Report as presented herein will also be presented for Audit with an up-dated Investment Report following the provision of Anglican Funds SA (AFSA) 2021 results (March 2022).

BankSA Cheque Account is the sole operating (working) account.

The AFSA investment funds and profits are retained in the Monthly Income Account and the Endowment Account. With very low interest rates the Term Deposit was transferred to the two Investment Accounts.

Appendix 1 outlines in greater detail income and expenditure relating to project funding (including Branch contributions).

Appendix 2 lists bequests which make up the Historical Fund, held in the Endowment Account.

The Ordinand Support Fund (\$4,085.00) is retained in the Monthly Income Account. Executive approved an allocation of \$1,000.00 to two recipients.

A special project – The Mothers' Union Adelaide Augustus Short Scholarship was initiated. The first payment of the \$6,500.00 has been made to the University of Adelaide from funds held in the Monthyly Account.

Income was recorded across five categories: transfers, subscriptions, donations, publication/printing, fundraising.

Expenditure as recorded across five categories: overheads, subscriptions, donations, publications, scholarships.

Anglican Funds SA managed

- The Monthly Income Account which received all interest generated by the Endowment Fund and the Term Deposit.
- The Endowment Fund Account which holds the Historical Fund
- The Term Deposit which was transferred in full during the year to the two above mentioned Funds.
