

A Report on Social Issues and Action

Dear MU Friends.

I have recently returned from a week in Newman visiting our family and it was such a joy to be present at the school assembly where all three school aged grandchildren were awarded Merit Certificates, without any collusion on behalf of their teachers. However, I witnessed an incident while out shopping which caused me great sadness which I would like to share with you all and would appreciate any feedback you may have. I was doing some grocery shopping when a young teenage girl next to me unwrapped the winter jacket she was carrying and proceeded to remove three aerosol spray cans from the shelf and place them inside her jacket, which she then re-wrapped. I questioned her, not unkindly and she replied before hurrying from the store, with the items still in her jacket.

I went to the front counter and explained the situation but was told by the staff that there was 'nothing' they could do. I found this to be seriously tragic and while walking the dog each evening with my grandchildren observed multiple empty aerosol cans lying around the streets. I returned to the store the following day to speak to the Manager, but although they were paged, no-one appeared.

Thankfully, I was able to gain the email address of the local Volatile Substance Use Prevention Coordinator to express my concern. Be still and know that I am God is a line from Psalm 46, which many of us are familiar with through song. God is our refuge and strength- we may not know the answers to problems we face, but we will have God's deep strength to deal with them. Please pray for this girl and the teenagers who feel they have no other solution but to sniff aerosol spray.

May I also refer you all to the May issue of the Anglican Messenger and the article relating to the Purple Bench Project in WA. In a number of our parishes, existing benches are being painted purple in honour of all victims of domestic homicide in WA and then placed in the grounds of their churches. Please have a discussion with your Parish Council or Wardens and check out your neighbourhood to see if any already exist. I found one at a park in Newman. This project was brought to our attention by our Archbishop who discovered one such bench while out walking in Esperance. May God continue to bless you all, Helen Krynen

Between 1986 and 1996 Joy was a member of the Paraburdoo Lioness Club, and when she returned to Perth in 1996, reconnected with Mothers Union through St Pauls Woodlands /Wembley Downs.

Joys interests have included sewing, knitting, and music. She joined a choir when they lived in Paraburdoo and later joined Churchlands Choir. Joy said that she has enjoyed being part of musicals and attending many music events. Joys recent funeral had many beautiful musical recordings that were made when she was in choirs. Vince and Joy have enjoyed being able to travel widely, worldwide, and have met many people and formed friendships along the way.

When we presented Joy with her 60 year MU Membership badge in 2022 Joy said that "Mothers Union has provided me with Christion fellowship and the opportunity to meet other women in the local community".

Unfortunately, Joy endured ill health for the last few years of her life but always remained positive and immaculately dressed and ready for whatever challenge came her way.

Glenys Pickford November 1942 - March 2023 Reflection on the Mothers Union from Glenys Pickford written in May 2022 for our Branch 60th Celebrations "I always knew I was going to join the Mothers Union as I knew how valuable it had been for my mum.

After marriage and moving into a new home in a new area it was great to join MU.

Church in Woodlands was being held in the Primary School but other parishioners in Wembley Downs were also meeting at their school but they started a Mother's Union Branch that initially met in homes and then in the United Church in Brix Street. I was invited to join them. It was the start of many lovely friendships. I was made a member on 21.5.1968. The enrolling member at that time was Irene Feakes.



(i) our conviction that God made and loves each individual and that every individual matters to Him. (Psalm 139:13-16; John 3:16)

(ii) our belief that marriage and family life God's way (ie, husbands loving their wives with the same kind of self-giving love that Jesus showed for us, wives giving their husbands respect and honour so that they can take responsibility for the family in ways which foster unity and mutual care) makes for strong, long-lasting marriages.

(iv) our belief that family life is enhanced and strengthened when parents treat their children gently, not provoking them to anger but training and instructing them in God's ways, and when children honour their parents. (Ephesians 5:22-6:4)

(v) we show that we belong to Jesus by having a global outlook and by offering help to anyone who needs it, not just our friends or those who belong to 'our group'. (Luke 10:25-36-Good Samaritan).

(vii) Primarily though, and underpinning all we do, is **our relationship with Christ Jesus.** His death on the cross, which brought us into relationship with God the Father, shows us what sacrificial living looks like and enables us to follow his example.

Without this, we run the risk of becoming just another helping agency, no different from the many others in our community

Sometimes we might be tempted to fly under the radar; to keep quiet about our commitment to Christ because we fear that we will be ridiculed, or worse. For example, our 1st Objective is very provocative in Australian society and even our church. It's very tempting to ignore it and focus instead on the 4th and 5th Objectives in our public activity and the 2nd and 3rd in our church life.

However, to be authentic to all our Objectives we need to work out ways of fulfilling 'our 1st Objective so that married couples can 'live their best life.'

To do this we must be **faithful in prayer for married couples** (how about dividing up the parish roll between the MU members for prayer?) **and in prayer for each other** as we interact with our families and others in the community, (perhaps by forming 'prayer triplets' to pray for our families, by taking neighbourhood 'prayer walks' or by being ready to give our personal testimony of how God has enabled us to honour him in our marriages and families).

Secondly, we must take our responsibility, as expressed in our other Objectives, seriously.

What are you, as an individual and a group, doing to encourage parents to bring up their children in the life and faith of the church? Is there more that you can do? Why not brainstorm at an upcoming meeting and commit yourselves to some action? (eg, offer to take turns in the creche or assist in Sunday school, become a prayer-partner to an individual youth or children's ministry leader, learn the names of the children in the church so you can pray for them, write thank-you notes to youth and children's leaders and/or parents).

How seriously do you pray for other MU members around the world? Do you keep abreast of world affairs so you know what's going on in places where it's difficult to be a Christian, or where poverty or natural disasters impact negatively on family life? How about taking turns to research the dioceses/countries we are linked with in the MU Wave of Prayer and spend 5 minutes in each meeting sharing and praying for them? Why not write some prayers for our linked dioceses based on Ephesians 1:17-19; Ephesians 4;1-2; Ephesians 6;10-18; Philippians 1:9-11; Philippians 4:4-9; (...cont. Pg7)
